In this paper, we make use of data from the LISS panel (Longitudinal Internet studies for the Social Sciences), which is administered and managed by the non-profit research institute Centerdata (Tilburg University, the Netherlands).

Reference to funding of LISS panel data in acknowledgments

The LISS panel data were collected by the non-profit research institute Centerdata (Tilburg University, the Netherlands). Funding for the panel's ongoing operations comes from the Domain Plan SSH and ODISSEI since 2019. The initial set-up of the LISS panel in 2007 was funded through the MESS project by the Netherlands Organization for Scientific Research (NWO).

Short description of the LISS panel for use in text

The LISS panel is a representative sample of Dutch individuals who participate in monthly internet surveys. The panel is based on a true probability sample of households drawn from the population register by Statistics Netherlands. Self-registration is not possible, and households that would otherwise be unable to participate are provided with a computer and internet connection. The longitudinal LISS Core Study, consisting of separate topical surveys, has been conducted in the panel every year since 2007, covering a large variety of domains including health, work, education, income, housing, leisure and time use, political views, values and personality.
